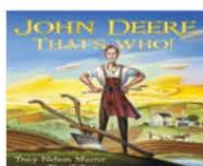
Wu Chien Shiung 's parents thought differently, so they gave her a name meaning "courageous hero" and encouraged her love of learning and science.
